Mass and Reconciliation on the First Saturday

Saturday, February 7th

Please join us the first Saturday of the month at 8:00am for Mass. The Sacrament of Reconciliation will follow Mass at 8:40 am. In reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary include the following elements, performed with the intention of reparation for blasphemies against the Immaculate Heart, for at least five consecutive months:

- 1) Confession (shortly before or after the First Saturday — so long as the person receives Holy Communion in a state of grace);
- 2) Holy Communion received on the First Saturday of each month;
- 3) the Holy Rosary, five decades recited sometime during the day; and
- 4) meditating for 15 minutes on the Mysteries of the Rosary



Sacraments—Anointing of the Sick

From The United States Catholic Catechism for Adults

When the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is given, the hoped-for effect is that, if it be God's will, the person be physically healed of illness. But even if there is no physical healing, the primary effect of the Sacrament is a spiritual healing by which the sick person receives the Holy Spirit's gift of peace and courage to deal with the difficulties that accompany serious illness or the frailty of old age. The Holy Spirit renews our faith in God and helps us withstand the temptations of the Evil One to be discouraged and despairing in the face of suffering and death. Also, a sick person's sins are forgiven if he or she was not able to go to Confession prior to the celebration of the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Another effect of this Sacrament is union with the Passion of Christ. By uniting ourselves more closely with the sufferings of Our Lord, we receive the grace of sharing in the saving work of Christ. In this way, our suffering, joined to the Cross of Christ, contributes to building up the People of God.

This Sacrament also prepares us for our final journey when we depart from this life. The Anointing of the Sick completes our identification with Jesus Christ that was begun at our Baptism. Its grace and power fortify us in our final struggles before we go to the Father's house.


Sacramento - Unción de los enfermos

Del Catecismo Católico de los Estados Unidos para adultos

Cuando se administra el sacramento de la Unción de Enfermos, el efecto que se espera es que, si Dios quiere, la persona sane físicamente de su enfermedad. Pero incluso si no hay sanación física, el principal efecto del sacramento es la curación espiritual mediante la cual el enfermo recibe el don del Espíritu Santo de la paz y la valentía para afrontar las dificultades que acompañan una grave enfermedad o la fragilidad de la vejez. El Espíritu Santo renueva nuestra fe en Dios y nos ayuda a soportar las tentaciones del Malvado de perder el ánimo y desesperarnos ante el sufrimiento y la muerte. También los pecados del enfermo son perdonados si no pudo confesarse antes de la celebración del sacramento de la Unción de Enfermos.

Otro efecto de este sacramento es la unión con la Pasión de Cristo. Al unirnos más íntimamente a los sufrimientos de Nuestro Señor, recibimos la gracia de compartir en la obra salvadora de Cristo. De esta manera, nuestro sufrimiento, unido a la Cruz de Cristo, contribuye al bien del Pueblo de Dios.

Este sacramento también nos prepara para nuestro viaje final, cuando dejamos esta vida. La Unción de los Enfermos completa nuestra identificación con Jesucristo, la cual empezó con nuestro Bautismo. Su gracia y poder nos fortalecen en nuestros últimos combates antes de ir a la casa del Padre.

CCC - ARTICLE 2 "AND IN JESUS CHRIST, HIS ONLY SON, OUR LORD"

IN BRIEF

452 The name Jesus means "God saves." The child born of the Virgin Mary is called Jesus, "for he will save his people from their sins" (Mt 1:21): "there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12).

453 The title "Christ" means "Anointed One" (Messiah). Jesus is the Christ, for "God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power" (Acts 10:38). He was the one "who is to come" (Lk 7:19), the object of "the hope of Israel" (Acts 28:20).

454 The title "Son of God" signifies the unique and eternal relationship of Jesus Christ to God his Father: he is the only Son of the Father (cf. Jn 1:14,18; 3:16,18); he is God himself (cf. Jn 1:1). To be a Christian, one must believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God (cf. Acts 8:37; 1 Jn 2:23).

455 The title "Lord" indicates divine sovereignty. To confess or invoke Jesus as Lord is to believe in his divinity. "No one can say 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit" (1 Cor 12:3).

80. Why do Catholics go to Mass on Sunday
